Projects:

Car-Fit-an AARP program that utilizes volunteers to check how persons are “fitting” in their cars for safety

Driver Safety Training- an AARP program that reviews up to date rules of the road with older drivers

911 Phone Projects- cell phones are collected and refurbished then given out to older persons who want them for security.

Free Car Checks- local garages donate their mechanics to check over cars in the fall to see if they are ready for winter driving. Law enforcement and volunteers are involved in the project.

Night Out Against Crime- local Triads participate in law enforcement sponsored events that promote crime prevention and safety

Dane County Annual Crime Prevention and Safety Conference and Expo- A committee of law enforcement members, volunteers and agencies meet monthly to plan the conference.

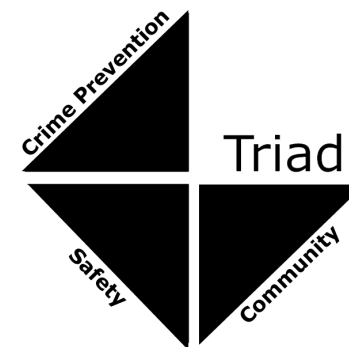
