They discussed the role volunteering has in decreasing feelings of loneliness and isolation for both the volunteer and the recipient. Diana created RSVP's successful Giving Tuesday campaign to encourage additional contributions to support volunteer efforts, Co-Chaired RSVP's 50th

Margie Zutter Honored as a Hometown Hero by Lisa Subeck, State Representative 78th Assembly District

At the beginning of Tuesday's (September 12th) Assembly floor session, on behalf of the State Assembly, I was pleased to welcome Margie Zutter as a Hometown Hero.

As an intern, Margie began working with the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) of Dane County in 1976, transitioning in 1977 to a full-time role as a Community Services Project Coordinator. She served as Assistant Director of RSVP of Dane County from 1979 until 2011 and assumed the role of Executive Director in 2012.

Under Margie's leadership, the organization flourished, achieving over 8 million hours contributed by volunteers and growing into one of the nation's most prominent RSVP programs with over 1,200 volunteers serving at over 80 nonprofits and public agencies, leading RSVP of Dane County to be named the recipient of the 2017 Governor's Service Award and the 2022 AmeriCorps Seniors Program of the Year.

Margie's commitment to helping older adults and promoting their rights and well-being reaches beyond the borders of Dane County, which is evident by her involvement as a board member of the National Senior Corps Association, her service as a past president of the Wisconsin Senior Corps Association, and her work on the Board of the Wisconsin Aging Advocacy Network.

Margie retired this summer from RSVP of Dane County after over 45 years of dedicated service but plans to continue serving our community's seniors as an RSVP volunteer!

Meet the new Group Projects & Homemakers Program Coordinator, Tara Curtis

Tara has seen the evidence of RSVP's Group Projects and Homeworkers volunteers' skill and commitment in the storeroom as she looks at the completed items ready to donate to community members in need. The time and effort volunteers put in leaves Tara feeling grateful, awed, and humbled.



Water heating is the second-largest single energy user in most homes. Here are some ways to save on water-heating costs.

- Set water heater temperature at 120°F.
- Conserve hot water by washing your clothes in cold water and taking shorter showers.
- Install a low-flow showerhead.

Stop Phantom Energy

If you're looking for ways to manage energy used by electronics, smart power strips can help save energy. Smart power strips detect when a device is not being used and then cut power to that device.

Skip the Space Heaters

Using your furnace, even for just a few hours a day, is more energy efficient than using a space heater. Also consider these tips:

- Use an electric blanket or put on a sweater.
- Get up and move around.
- Let in the sun during the day to warm a room and close your window treatments in the evening to keep out the colder night air.

RSVP of Dane County

Triad's Secret Sauce is Partnershipby Mike Thomsen, RSVP Triad Program Coordinator

Partnership has always been Triad's secret sauce, and hat was especially true in September. RSVP's Triad volunteers, in partnership with the AARP Wisconsin and Smart Motors Toyota, focused their energy on driver safety in September. The winter driving season in Wisconsin is particularly treacherous, and being well-prepared is key to keeping safe on the roads. Thanks to this partnership, 50 drivers are better prepared.

The first event, an AARP Smart Driver Course, was organized by Neil McCallum, the AARP Driver Safety program State Coordinator. The course was held on September 22nd at Smart Motors Toyota and was free of charge to participants thanks to the generosity of Smart Motors. A total of eleven drivers received a four hour in-classroom refresher on safe driving practices.

The "Car Check" vehicle safety inspection event and the "AARP Car Fit" event were held on September 28th at Smart Motors. Car Check, organized by Triad volunteers, offered participants a thorough, bumper-to-bumper safety inspection that included detailed service and maintenance recommendations. The inspections were free of charge, thanks to Smart Motors' generosity, and were performed by a team of Smart Motors technicians. Twenty-two cars were inspected.

Car Fit was organized by Neil McCallum, who is also a Triad volunteer, and provided an opportunity for drivers to consult with an occupational therapist and a team of technicians to find safe, comfortable seating positions behind the wheel. Sixteen drivers, considerably more than last year, participated in the hour-and-a-half event. Without the partnership between RSVP of Dane County, AARP Wisconsin and Smart Motors Toyota, these driver safety events would not have been possible. Thank you to Neil McCallum and the AARP Driver Safety program. Starting an RSVP Group is a Great Way to Build and Nourish Community! by Tara Curtis, RSVP Group Projects Coordinator

The Middleton Glen Knit Pickers RSVP group was started during the pandemic when RSVP volunteer and Middleton Glen Retirement Community resident Jo Hershberger noticed that other residents were losing their spirits. "We needed something to do in our apartments," Jo said, and so she went to work by first reaching out to the Director at Middleton Glen. "I thought 'I could start a group!' I'm not a very good knitter, but I could start a group." Group member and RSVP Volunteer Marge Nelson came up with the name Knit Pickers, and with that a great group was born!

RSVP Group Projects groups are a wonderful way to socialize and find comradery while giving back to the community. One member of the Middleton Knit Pickers joined the group after moving to Middleton Glen from California. Other members work on projects in tandem, playing to their individual skill sets and strengths to create collaborative projects.

Jo says her knitting skills have grown considerably, along with the size of their group and the group's impact. One member, Hilda McCreight, brought with her some dishcloths knitted by her great-grandchildren during their vacation in the Tetons. The Group also works with another group in the area by collecting their knitted and crocheted squares, and joining them with borders into afghans. Each year, they host the Knit Pickers Fair, which is an opportunity for them to show residents at Middleton Glen what they've made over the summer. After the fair, all items are donated to RSVP to be given to Dane County residents in need.

"We can't function without the reciprocal relationship we have with RSVP," Jo recently explained to the group. "They supply the yarn, volunteers knit the things, and then RSVP distributes those items to organizations in need."

The Middleton Glen Knit Pickers is a closed group, meaning that one must be a resident of Middleton Glen Senior Apartments to join. Their story is a great model of how to start a group, and an excellent example of how beneficial groups can be for crafters and their communities. 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Wayne D. Horner Memorial Stand Down Madison – What is it and When Does it Take Place

This year's event, to be held Saturday, October 21, 2023 from 8:30 AM until 1:00 PM marks the 30th Anniversary of Stand Down. RSVP Vets Helping Vets has been part of Stand Down Madison for the past several years as an active board member, volunteer, and community partner.
