

## **RSVP....where volunteers make a difference**

The theme for 2024, 'NEIGHBORS HELPING NEIGHBORS', captures the spirit of RSVP of Dane County. Volunteering is, at its heart, about caring for one another, and RSVP is honored to be the bridge that connects seniors with opportunities to give back and make a real difference in the lives of others. We are committed to supporting local seniors and veterans in ways that strengthen our entire community, harnessing the power of volunteerism to make a meaningful difference.

Highlights from 2024:

- The annual April Open House embraced an international theme, featuring global cuisine from local restaurants and grocers. The event provided a valuable opportunity for community outreach, helping to inform both new and current volunteers about the full range of RSVP programs. Held during National Volunteer Week, it also celebrated the lasting impact of our volunteers.
- In 2024, the RSVP Vets Helping Vets (VHV) Program hosted two special events honoring veterans. In April, an event at the Middleton VFW featured Kevin Hampton, curator and historian from the Wisconsin Veterans Museum, who gave a presentation on World War I. In November, the Annual Veterans Day event included a performance by local veteran band Vets for Frets and a presentation by Kevin Hampton titled *"Wisconsin Was There: D-Day."*
- On September 11, RSVP held its annual drive-thru donation event in remembrance of 9/11. Staff and volunteers collected food and essential items for the Social Justice Center's resource pantry.
- In September, we celebrated RSVP's 52nd anniversary with a 'Mad Hatter Tea Party-themed' volunteer appreciation event at Barnwood Events in Madison. Dr. Roopa Shah gave the keynote address, and John Stofflet served as master of ceremonies. More than 200 volunteers, partner representatives, funders, and sponsors attended to honor the vital contributions of our volunteers. Six volunteers received the President's Lifetime Achievement Award for contributing over 4,000 hours, and 18 received the RSVP Length of Service Award for 20 years of continuous service.
- The Driver Services Program launched a comprehensive marketing campaign to recruit more volunteer drivers, addressing the growing number of passengers in need of medical rides. One of the most successful recruitment tools was our bus tail advertisements, created in partnership with Madison Metro Transit.
- Monthly Zoom presentations were offered to volunteers, partners, and community members to help prevent loneliness and social isolation among seniors. Presentations included guest speakers from Henry Vilas Zoo, Gentle Breeze Honey, Aldo Leopold Nature Center, and Gail Ambrosius Chocolatier.
- In November, a two-part virtual Triad Conference was held, focusing on two key themes: *Senior Safety in Our Digital World* and *Senior Safety at Home*. The event featured four professional presentations that provided valuable education to older adults and professionals from Dane County, as well as participants from ten other counties across Wisconsin.

2024 was a year of growth and impact. Over 1,240 volunteers contributed 136,708 service hours across more than 80 nonprofit and public agencies. We welcomed 244 new volunteers and added several new stations. By partnering with local nonprofits, we created new volunteer opportunities, such as the Phone Pals Program. Together with NewBridge, Goodman Community Center, and Madison Senior Center, we secured a state grant to combat social isolation among older adults. We launched a new senior tech training program in collaboration with Senior Planet from AARP. Most volunteers returned to in-person service while we continued to offer fun virtual options. We sincerely thank all our volunteers for their dedication and the difference they make in our community.

## HISTORY, MISSION, AND VISION STATEMENT

### HISTORY

In 1969, the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) was created as a national volunteer program under the Administration on Aging as part of the Older Americans Act. In 1971, eleven programs were launched, and they became part of the national volunteer agency ACTION (now the Corporation for National and Community Service-AmeriCorps Seniors programs.)

In 1972, we became the first RSVP program in Wisconsin. In 2000, we added a Foster Grandparent Program (FGP). Today, 170,000 AmeriCorps Seniors volunteers in RSVP, FGP, and Senior Companion programs serve nationwide. With over 1,200 volunteers, RSVP of Dane County is one of the largest AmeriCorps Seniors programs in the United States.

#### MISSION

To make a positive impact in the community by recruiting volunteers 55 and older to help public and nonprofit organizations deliver essential services to people of all ages and identities, providing Dane County with a valuable resource.

RSVP seeks to:

- utilize the skills, knowledge, and life experiences of people who are retired, helping them to lead healthy, productive lives;
- respond to increasing requests for volunteers to help meet critical needs;
- increase the variety of volunteer opportunities;
- provide opportunities for intergenerational projects and age-integrated activities;
- plan programming in cooperation with the groups, agencies, and institutions with which it is involved, as needed and requested;
- involve volunteers in planning and decision-making on community programs, boards, and committees;
- increase public awareness concerning contributions and needs of people age 55 and older, and improve the image of aging.

### VISION

RSVP aspires to build and expand a community-wide network of volunteers and organizations that value individual differences, life experiences, knowledge, innovation, self-expression, and talent.

RSVP strives to enrich the lives of senior volunteers and enhance support services for all Dane County residents.

## WHO WE ARE/VOLUNTEERS IN SERVICE

RSVP seeks to utilize the skills, knowledge, and life experiences of older adults, helping them lead healthy, productive lives while making a positive impact in the community. RSVP volunteers provide direct service, helping a wide variety of public and nonprofit organizations in Dane County. What makes RSVP so unique? Volunteers are personally interviewed and matched with appropriate assignments that meet their time, interest, and lifestyle needs, as well as skills required by community agencies. We also provide regular follow-up to ensure volunteer satisfaction. Survey results indicate that over 94% of RSVP volunteers feel their volunteer work keeps them active, and that they have a more positive outlook because they help their community.




## Group Projects/ Homeworkers

They also make tote bags, walker and wheelchair bags, chemo caps, fidget quilts, and a variety of other useful specialty items. All of these handcrafted goods are then distributed to local nonprofit and public agencies, to be given to those in need.



Foster Grandparent Program volunteers serve in classrooms between 5 and 30 hours per week providing focused one-on-one support to enhance school readiness, school engagement, and promote social/emotional regulation and academic success for students in Dane County elementary schools, After School Programs, and Reach Dane Head Start classrooms. In addition they make an impact by serving as remote penpals supporting emerging writers with practice and composition skills during the early years of development. Income eligible adults age 55+ receive a tax-free stipend, meal, and travel reimbursements to remove barriers to service. Foster Grandparents are committed to lifelong learning and continue to grow in their role through inservice trainings and Book Club participation.

Intergenerational volunteers serve students, teachers, and classrooms throughout Dane County. Volunteers can be found in schools, afterschool programs, community centers, and nonprofit programs, serving in a wide variety of roles. You will find volunteer tutors, mentors, classroom assistants, guest speakers, and computer buddies offering student support to increase engagement and improve student success. Intergenerational volunteers provide the presence of an additional adult allowing the added attention needed to increase student confidence in learning.

# Driver Services

Volunteer drivers provide help that promotes independent living for Dane County Seniors, 60 years and older, and Veterans of any age, through three different programs plus the Vets Helping Vets Program.

## **Driver Escort**

Drivers provide rides to Dane County residents, 60 years and older, to medical and other important appointments.

## **Home Delivered Meals**

Drivers deliver noon hour meals to seniors and veterans in Dane County communities outside Madison/Monona to help them maintain access to healthy, nutritious meals.

## **Food Bridge**

Drivers are paired with a senior living in Madison or Monona who is lowincome and homebound, to shop for and deliver groceries from area food pantries to them on a regular basis.



## **Audited Financial Statement**

The Legacy and Rent Stabilization Fund Investment management policies are designed to provide 4% to 6% of the year end balances to support personnel, facility and equipment costs, to enhance volunteer programs, to foster new programs, to provide grant matching funds, and to assist with short-term cash flow needs.

## **GIVING STATEMENT**

There are several ways to make a contribution to RSVP:

Annual Fund, Memorials and Tributes: Volunteers, family members, and friends can be recognized through a tribute or memorial listed in *RSVP News Notes*, our quarterly newsletter.

**Tony Farina Endowment Fund:** This permanent endowment fund was created in 1998 to support RSVP volunteer programs. You may make your gift directly to RSVP of Dane County, Inc. or to the Madison Community Foundation by noting your contribution is for the Tony Farina Endowment Fund for RSVP.

**Heideman Endowed Fund for Staff Compensation:** This fund was created in 2007 to provide program and support staff with a minimal salary increase during difficult economic times. You may make your gift directly to RSVP by noting your contribution is for the Heideman Endowed Fund.

**Legacy Fund:** By including a planned gift in your estate plan, you help to ensure that RSVP will have the financial support to continue its programs for future generations. You also make a lasting, powerful statement to family and friends about your values and encourage others to share in your vision.

In 2015, RSVP received significant planned gifts from the Eileen Erb Trust and the Dave Stucki Individual Retirement Account, establishing a Legacy Fund. Our **Legacy Circle** recognizes our friends and supporters whose generous donations will help us meet the ever-growing demands for our services in the future.

**In-Kind Gifts:** RSVP welcomes in-kind contributions, which are tax-deductible, such as program supplies, volunteer appreciation gifts, and office equipment or supplies.

The Leadership Circle, formed in 2008, recognizes individuals whose combined contributions to RSVP are \$2,000 or over. These contributions have been significant, enabling RSVP to maintain and expand services.

**Qualified Charitable Distribution** - If you are 70 1/2 or older, you can make charitable gifts directly from your individual retirement account (IRA) to RSVP of Dane County or other qualifying charities reduce your taxable income. If you are 73 or older, these gifts can help satisfy your required minimum distribution (RMD) for the year while giving pretax dollars to charity.

**Donor-Advised Funds** - A donor-advised fund (DAF) is a powerful way to build or continue a tradition of family philanthropy by establishing a charitable investment account, receiving an immediate deduction, and recommending grants to your charities of choice over time. The investment growth is tax-free. Please consult your financial advisor to learn more about setting up a DAF to benefit RSVP of Dane County.

**Matching Gifts** - Many companies offer a matching gift program to encourage charitable giving among their employees, including sponsors and retirees. Contact your HR department to see if your company has a matching program that can increase the impact of your donation. Some companies also donate to RSVP of Dane County if they know you are a registered RSVP volunteer.
